



Kelly's Korner

In our gospel reading from John this week, Jesus will tell his disciples *I will not leave you*. Although these words were originally spoken to the disciples, we believe them to be true for us as well. The one who is the center of our faith will not leave us alone. What peace, what comfort such words bring us.

Until we find ourselves in a truly difficult spot. Until we feel as if all our loved ones have abandoned us. Until we isolate ourselves. Until we attempt to escape our lives in frivolous ways (which often just compounds or delays issues).

We must become so alone, so utterly alone, that we withdraw into our innermost self. It is a way of bitter suffering. But then our solitude is overcome, we are no longer alone, for we find that our innermost self is the spirit, that it is God, the indivisible. And suddenly we find ourselves in the midst of the world, yet undisturbed by its multiplicity, for our innermost soul we know ourselves to be one with all being.—

Hermann Hesse

Hesse's life was difficult. Time in mental hospitals. Estranged from parents. Unsatisfying work led him toward more spiritual ventures. His words echo Jesus. Jesus told the disciples that when he was no longer with them, the spirit would come. The spirit abides with us. The spirit is in us. Sometimes we have to hit rock bottom to understand. Sometimes we have to be completely alone.

And yet, some of us are just too afraid to be alone. In this day and age we have our phones and tablets and computers to avoid being alone. Radios and TVs provide background noise. Being alone with our thoughts is just too difficult. Silence engulfs and overwhelms us.

C. S. Lewis in *The Weight of Glory* writes: "*We live, in fact, in a world starved for solitude, silence, and private: and therefore starved for meditation and true friendship.*" Whether they be difficult, stressful moments or intentional times of holy conversation, the quiet and alone times may be the best opportunities to reconnect with the divine and remember we are not alone.

On behalf of the Elders and the Board, we write to inform you of a new undertaking. Two weeks ago, we became aware of a need with one of our newest members. He is new to Macomb and suddenly found himself without a place to live and no food. The Elders met after the service to have discussion. A few days later a second meeting was held to have further discussion. After hearing many details the Elders unanimously voted to help.

The Trustees and the Board met this past Monday evening. Part of their discussions included this situation. The Trustees decided to use funds to offer aid for this young man. The Board ratified the decision.

Our commitment to this man is to see to his basic needs for the next three months. It is our hope to help find housing and employment and to prepare him to be able to cover living expenses after that time. There are people working very hard to accomplish these tasks. The fund the Trustees identified as the starting point for covering such expenses is probably less than will be needed. Folks have helped with job applications and interviews. Currently, there is a feverish attempt to find affordable housing. More help is needed in all of these areas. If you are able to help in any way contact us or Rev. Kelly Ingersoll. (If you want to help with a monetary donation and run it through the church treasurer's office, please add the donation to your weekly giving and mark it plainly "member aid" on your envelope/check.)

Kelly reminded the Elders, Trustees, and the Board that we help because we find it in our hearts to do so—that we always respond in faith. We hope not to be taken advantage of (and we do not go into this situation blindly), but we place no expectations on what the outcome may be for this man or on our relationship with him. We pray that all will work out—that he stabilizes his life and becomes an outstanding member of both the Macomb community and the First Christian Church community of faith.

Please keep all these efforts and your participation with them in your prayers.
